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POLL: 59.4% OF LIKELY VOTERS BELIEVE ELECTION INTEGRITY ISSUES AFFECTED THE OUTCOME OF THE 2020 U.S. PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION

Americans remain concerned about election integrity.
45.9% of respondents rank election integrity as “most important”.

SARASOTA, FL — Americans remain concerned about election integrity – both in response to the November 2020 Presidential Election, and the upcoming 2022 Midterm Elections.

A new question this month asked voters how they would rank the issue of election integrity. 45.9% of respondents rank it as “most important.” Among all respondents, 78.8% ranked it as an “important” issue. 44.5% of respondents indicate “too little” is being done to improve election integrity, while 30.8% say efforts to improve election integrity are “about right.”

The results of the latest commissioned national survey conducted between November 1-2 show that 59.4% of respondents said that election integrity issues affected the outcome of the 2020 U.S. Presidential Election. This represents a 2% decrease from last month.

Also, 9.9% of respondents are unsure, which, when added to “significant” and “very significant,” indicates two-thirds of respondents do not have confidence in the outcome of the 2020 Presidential Election.

The poll also highlighted some additional key takeaways:

- 38.5% of respondents believe the 2022 elections will be fair (even since last month).
- 61.5% of respondents either do not agree the 2022 elections will be fair or they are unsure or neutral as to whether they will be fair (even since last month).
- A majority of respondents continue to express doubt about the 2022 elections.

This poll of likely voters on these issues has been conducted regularly since April 2021. The poll posed several timely questions to likely voters, the first being consistent across all five months:

"Election integrity issues affected the outcome of the 2020 US Presidential Election in a way that was: Not Significant, Significant, Very Significant, Unsure".

The latest poll sampled approximately 2,065 likely voters with weighting methods, where permitted by data, were used to match with demographic groupings determined by the U.S. Census Bureau.

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
